The American experiment of 1776 ushered in the dawn of a new world order, one that would redefine how nations functioned and interacted. The computer age brought about an upheaval in how we interact with one another personally—a new world order in human communication. Saint Paul wrote to the Corinthians about how Adam was the first being who ushered in human life, and how Jesus was the new Adam, who ushered in a new life-giving spirit. Jesus initiated a new world order, one that redefined what it meant to be human and contained a new spiritual dimension. "Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you... give to everyone who asks of you...do to others as you would have them do to you.... Be merciful, just as [also] your Father is merciful" (Luke 6:27–36).

The fact that there are many who think this is not a practical or useful way to live—to say nothing of whether it is desirable or even possible—does not negate its power to transform human relationships as well as our very own spirits. None of us do it as well as we might hope, which only attests to the fact that we live with a foot in each of two worlds—the earthly one and the heavenly one. Empowered by God's Spirit, we are still growing into the people God created us to be. •

Ben (March 24) [who apparently will be celebrating his birthday in Rome this year); and Meredith Alvarez (March 30). Abundant birthday blessings to all of you!

This week marks the three-year invasion of the Ukraine by Russia on February 24, 2022. There has been an ongoing entry on the bulletin's list for the Parish Prayer Line since the beginning of the invasion. The people of Ukraine have suffered terribly in the last three years, and we need to continue those prayers.

The Catholic Church has a strong presence in the Ukraine, with Franciscan priests ministering to the people of the Ukraine. In eastern Ukraine there are approximately 15 parishes with five friars serving them. In western Ukraine, there are 15 friars serving additional parishes. The number of parishes varies due to the war.

Those friars provide soup kitchens, orphanages, medical clinics, food, water, schools and basic necessities in addition to their religious duties. Pope Francis also periodically sends equipped ambulances and supplies to the Ukraine. If Ukraine falls to the Russians, what will happen to the Ukrainians and to our faith? Please pray protection over all the people of Ukraine, for the end of the war, and for a just peace.

This March, from March 11 to March 27, Fr. Ben will be in Rome.
